The Muslim Husband

- Bread winner
- Housing, food and clothing
- (As long as they are married)
- Imam of the household
- Have protective jealousy towards his wife
- Can beat lightly if wife is disobedient (nushuz)
- Can take a further wife

The Muslim Wife

- Obey him
- Keep husband happy
- Not refuse intimacy
- Remain attractive for him
- Look after the home

Seek permission

- to leave the house
- to work
- to make friends
- Remain stern towards others

Saad bin Ubada, a companion of The Prophet, said, "If I saw a man with my wife, I would strike him (behead him) with the blade of my sword."

This news reached Allah's Messenger (pbuh) who then said,

"You people are astonished at Saad's Ghirah (protective jealousy). By Allah, I have more Ghirah than he, and Allah has more Ghirah than I, and because of Allah's Ghirah, He has made unlawful shameful deeds and sins (adultery) done in open and in secret."

Men are the protectors and maintainers of women, because Allah has given the one more (strength) than the other, and because they support them from their means.

Thus righteous women are obedient and guard the rights of men in their absence under Allah's protection.



THE PATRIARCHAL PARADIGM




Husband housing:

LOVE: HUB

- Hub has same root as Hab seed
- Muhammad (saw) was mending his shoes, forehead was sweating. Aisha RA recited poetry he kissed her forehead.

• Aisha RA asked how Muhammad (saw) would describe his love for her.

• 'Like a strong binding knot' he replied. The more you tug, the stronger it gets. Aisha would ask him playfully 'How is the knot?' 'As strong as the first day (you asked) he replied.'



STAGES IN A RELATIONSHIP



MUTUAL RESPECT, LOVE AND UNDERSTANDING

RED FLAGS

- Beware of being alone in private/being pressurised towards physical intimacy, before marriage
- Beware of one who pushes for secrecy and does not seek to involve those who look out for you, e.g. your parents/father
- Be aware of how power/age can affect dynamics
- The Nikah is an open declaration of union.
 Beware secret marriages see 'On secret Marriages' by Sh. Akram Nadwi

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND COERCIVE CONTROL

- Controlling, coercive, threatening behaviour, violence or abuse.
- Assault, threats, humiliation and intimidation causing harm, or frightening the victim.
- Control, Manipulation, Belief that men have a preordained right to be in charge of all aspects of a relationship.
- Mainly affects women, can affect men
- TIRMIDHI: "THE BEST OF YOU IS THE BEST TO HIS WIVES, AND I AM THE BEST OF YOU TO MY WIVES."

I. DISCUSS

What kind of things is it important to know about yourself before considering marriage?

- Is it important to know yourself?
- There is a saying One who knows himself, knows his Lord

A few examples:

- What drives you/makes you angry/ irritates you?
- Do you have fixed views on gender roles in marriage?
- Are you good at discussing how you feel?
- Are you a good listener/empathic?
- Are there traumas you need to work through?
- What are your faults?
- Do you want to work/study?
- Where have you learnt what good marriages look like?
- Are you wanting to live with extended family?

IST SCENARIO

- Rosy lives at home. Her parents have a poor relationship and are often arguing. She has craved stability.
- Rosy was not allowed far from home and will only be allowed to live away if married.
- Rosy's best friend recently married and is very happy.
- Rosy has met Usman who is currently unemployed. He promises her he will get a job and they will live happily together. he spends most of the day out with friends playing pool, watching films and gaming.
- He promises her that once they are married he will get work- its just a matter of time. He will provide
- He does not want to meet her friends or family.
- He has not introduced her to his family- he says they have broken off.
- She is considering marrying him,

2. DISCUSS

How important is it to know what you are looking for? Please give examples

- What have the marriages of those close to you been like?
 Strengths and weaknesses
- What qualities are you looking for? It may help to know why. Are you looking for a companion with whom you mutually share and understand one another's dreams and goals?
- How important are friendship, similar values, income, wealth, culture, interests... Remember beauty grows with affection and can fade. What are your priorities?
- Are you looking for a high earner/a stay at home wife?
- What are you absolute non negotiables? What are you willing to negotiate on?
- Does this person respect your values/live according to the dictates of the faith?
- How do you feel about living with extended family?

2ND SCENARIO

- Salman has met Ruby through a Muslim marriage introductory service and they seem to get on.
- Ruby has completed her PhD in Biomedical Science and is keen to spend her life at the cutting edge of research to cure certain cancers. She is driven and motivated.
- Salman and Ruby get on well together; they both have a great sense of humour, have similar hobbies and their families get on well.
- After marriage, Ruby is asked by Salman to stay at home and care for his elderly parents. He hopes that they will have a large family and he is keen to be the sole provider. Ruby is surprised and had not anticipated this request. She wanted to balance career and family.

WHAT SKILLS HELP BUILD A SOLID MARRIAGE?

Some answers:

- Having shared life values
- What may your weaknesses be that need working on before marriage- Practice
- Praise/ Respect/ Appreciation/ Forgiveness/ Trust/ Commitment/
 Fun/ Praying together
- Respecting those you love eg family/friends
- Understanding each other's dreams and aspirations. Encouraging them.
- Respecting the individuality of your partner: inter-dependence.
- Negotiating major life events e.g. both working full time/after a child/grief/illness.
- Not to compare to others

3RD SCENARIO

- Shama and Adil have been married for 2 years. Adil is an extrovert and loves to invite family and friends. Shama is an introvert and likes quiet time at home, pottering around and reading.
- They both work.
- Adil has invited family for the weekend to celebrate Shama's promotion. Shama has had a hard week at work. She does not want to clean, cook or host guests. She believes that Adil is insensitive regarding how hard she works. "You don't understand how tired I get. You are selfish and take me for granted. You don't want time alone with me. You don't love me."
- Adil- "Nothing I do is good enough. You always find fault. I should just stop trying."

CONFLICT MANAGEMENT

Beware of:

- Avoiding conflict
- Being defensive
- Overgeneralising
- Wanting to be right/not listening
- Making character attacks
- Stonewalling

INTIMACY/ SEX

- Spiritual, physical, emotional and sexual health are gifts from Allah
- Have we learnt about sexual intimacy in positive ways or from films/ online/ porn. Evidence: school children are learning that violence is acceptable eg choking. 'Purify your gaze.'
- Stems from deep affection, desire and sometimes the drive to please ...not from demand/threats. Requires feeling confident, appreciated and loved not criticised and humiliated.
- Is important for both parties-there can be a mismatch in needs which requires frank discussion and working on,
- Requires a build up of playfulness, attention and foreplay. Hadith "send a messenger"
- It is selfish to be satisfied whilst neglecting the needs of your spouse. Don't withhold sex as a way of passive aggression.
- The first night need not be a race or a tick box. Take time/ wait for signs that your body is ready (this can take longer for women). Be gentle, merciful, encouraging and accepting that it may take time.
- There is no test for virginity/ seeking blood on sheets.
- Menstrual cycles, pregnancy, illness and post -birth states require gentle negotiation/ finding new ways during different stages of life.
